The Reverend Arthur S. Hanson




With joy and great sadness, we bid farewell to Pastor Arthur S. Hanson who left us on 9 February 2017. The son of Charles and Olivia Hanson, Arthur was born in 1922 in Wegdahl, Minnesota. He was graduated from Dubuque University and the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, and was ordained on 15 June

1947. He began his ministry with the Board of American Missions in Washington, followed by parish work in Minnesota, Pennsylvania, and Maryland; serving seven different churches, concluding with twelve years as Director of Pastoral Care and Chaplaincy with the Lutheran Home and Hospital Association. Along with his call to the chaplaincy, since 1979 he also assisted Pastor John Austin; and in 1990 he was designated as Visitation Pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church, Aberdeen, Maryland. Pastor Hanson was a Certified Hospital Chaplain, a long-time member of the College of Chaplains, the American Protestant Association, and served as a supervisor in Clinical Pastoral Education programs in the Baltimore area.

A World War II Navy veteran, he served on and was chairman of a number of Synodical, Conference, and District Committees. Articles he wrote were published in newspapers, journals, and magazines, including *The Lutheran*. Pastor Hanson served as a Scoutmaster and member of the Executive Board of the area Scouting Councils of Maryland and Minnesota. His interest in Scouting developed from his many years as a Boy Scout in his youth. He loved baseball, crossword puzzles, and poetry.

After moving to Williamsburg in 1999, Pastor Hanson served as needed in the area Lutheran Churches, most especially, Our Saviour's in Norge. He also spent many years enjoying his membership with Norwegians Worldwide, Williamsburg Chapter.

Pastor Hanson was preceded in death by his parents, Charles and Olivia Hanson; brothers, Clinton, Wendell, and Hank; sister, Hazel and his daughter, Elizabeth. He is survived by his wife of 68 years, Irene; his son Luther and his wife Carol; his sister-in-law Elaine Smith of Arkansas, and many nieces and nephews in Minnesota and Arkansas.

New sound system installed

James River Audio Visual installed the new sound system during the week of 20 February. The \$7,500 new sound system was made possible by a \$4,000 donation from the estate of George Marston. The remaining balance was raised from members and organizations that use Our Saviour's Lutheran Church's facilities. The new sound comes with two wireless microphones and two microphone booms for voice or instruments, four wireless units for the hearing impaired, a wireless headphone microphone, and the capability to use an iPod to play music. The speaker system is designed to give the same sound in the back of the church as in the front. Thank you to everyone who contributed to this important project.

We started 2017 with a snow storm forcing the cancellation of our worship service. While we were on pace to match or even exceed expenses, we slipped meeting our Plan for Ministry Giving by \$2,169.00 and exceeded our budget expenses by \$784.00. We are now in a negative \$2,953.00. Please consider an extra donation so we can continue the momentum of matching or exceeding our expenses.

Simply Giving is an easy way to support OSLC's ministries, especially when weather forces a cancellation of a service, or you are unable to attend. This provides a steady income stream rather than fluctuations. Go to our website (www.oslcnorge.org.) Click on "Donate" on the menu bar. The drop down menu will appear. Click on "Simply Giving", "Donate Now", "Create Profile" on lower right corner. After creating your profile, enter the amount you want to give in the appropriate field, the frequency, and the start date. Click "continue". Thank you for all that you do to make OSLC a vibrant ambassador for Christ.

Use of the commercial kitchen

There are two start-up businesses that are leasing Our Saviour's commercial kitchen: Divine Lunches and Alpha Pit Smokers. Since the income that the church will receive from these two businesses is taxable, a Commercial Kitchen Committee was established by the Church Council. The purpose of this committee is to oversee and manage the appropriate use of the commercial kitchen.

The committee responsibilities are:

- Overseeing the use of the commercial kitchen
- Maintaining commercial kitchen equipment (e.g., cleanliness, quarterly in-depth cleaning, material condition, inspections, etc.)
- Establishing policies for the use of the commercial kitchen and rental fees with Parish Council approval
- Interviewing potential leasees of the commercial kitchen and approving lease agreements
- Maintaining contact information of leasees and providing updates to the Parish Administrator
- Training people on the use of the commercial kitchen
- Keeping an inventory of the utensils and replacing utensils as necessary
- Managing a Commercial Kitchen Account to receive funds, disburse funds, and to pay appropriate taxes on the income from the commercial kitchen
- Making monthly reports to the Parish Council
- Submitting financial records to the Parish Council's Audit Committee for the annual audit
- Developing policies (e.g., fees, maintenance, use, etc.) governing the commercial kitchen for Parish Council approval

While members of the church and the organizations that use the hall may have access to the kitchen, they must contact the church office (call Monday to Thursday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at 757.564.3745 or by email at oslcnoige@verizon.net) to schedule the kitchen. Divine Lunches will be using the kitchen from Monday to Friday from 6 a.m. to 12 noon. Alpha Pit Smokers will be using the kitchen, most often, on Fridays, Saturdays, and some Sundays. Alpha Pit Smokers primarily caters events. **The Health Inspector will make unannounced inspections during the operations of these two businesses.** That means, with rare exceptions, no one else – especially if he or she lacks a food handling certificate – should be in the kitchen.

The businesses will be storing some of their equipment in the kitchen. Also, they will be using the left-side of the refrigerator. Members of the church may use the right-side of the refrigerator to store items temporarily for their event. Lunches, sodas, condiments and other items may be stored in the refrigerator in the space where the tables and chairs are stored. Everything must be labeled and dated if the food product is not in its original container or packaging. Items not labeled and dated will be discarded.

If a member or an organization plans to use the kitchen equipment, they will need to be trained on the proper use of the equipment and they are responsible to clean the equipment and kitchen. There is a reference binder in the kitchen that will assist the individual or individuals on how to use and clean the equipment and kitchen appropriately. It is critical that the kitchen equipment be maintained in pristine condition.

"God has given my life a purpose and meaning and joy by changing it from total blackness to a radiant and glorious adventure." You may recall Bill starts his book on one of the low moments of his life. His wife leaving him and moving 1,000 miles away with their two daughters. Chapter One: "Embrace The Hurt" picks up after he had a visit with his daughters and they left to go back to their "other" home. His phone rang and it was a friend who knew his feelings about his children, the recent visit and the lack of peace in his heart. My friend prayed and asked God to give him some wisdom to share with me. Yes, it was "Embrace the Hurt". In other words, accept you are hurting, knowing you cannot change it alone. "You would not be the person you are today without the hurt you have already suffered" my friend continued. Now you and I can agree that is sound advice and the hurt you are suffering can help you be God's hands and feet to help other hurting people. But, how do you do that? Bill sums up this chapter with one word "hope". What would any of us do without our belief in a God who acts? What do people in deep trouble do without any faith? Resolve to trust God, embrace the hurt and gain inward peace in spite of the circumstances. By sharing this with you, maybe with God's help, these words will help you.

Chapter Two: "I've Been There Too". What is more helpful than having someone you know, someone who lives the mantra and will take the time to say to you "I understand, and I love you"? How healing those simple words are. The time it takes is minimal but the caring of someone to reach you and tell you is all the difference from someone you see as "having it all together". One of the things I have very humbly learned as a Stephen Minister is the person(s) I most want to emulate are struggling with problems in their own life and experiencing deep feelings of inadequacy. When I thought I had no prayer to offer for someone hurting, I realized I wasn't alone and I didn't have to have it all together, and that is ok. We have all been there. I can minister to those who ask because I know the One who is the real leader is not me. You see we are not healers as Stephen Ministers, we will walk with you and let the Holy Spirit be our guide. The healing comes from Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior.

Chapter Three: "You Shouldn't Feel That Way". One of the things they teach us in Stephen Leader Training is what not to say. This wasn't necessarily in the training manual but I agree with Bill it is pointless. The should or should not doesn't change the way anyone actually feels, it might make them feel guilty and not share with you again or like your teenager respond with "NO You Don't Understand"! Bill picks up his story with continuing his grief about his divorce. He received a letter from a dear friend who said to Bill "I grieve with you over the remarriage of your wife. The pain and grief are inexpressible, I am sure." And it was signed "Your Friend". Bill shares he can't put into words how this affirmation made him feel better. If the author had said "You shouldn't feel that way, it's over"! Bill, as well as you or I, might very well have felt worse or angry. Bill reminds us the greatest consolation in a time of deep despair is the knowledge that God has worked in our lives in the past and will again. Bill states "Until we reach that stage and none of us are there until a time of trial, until God has rescued us, the best thing that can happen to us is to have loving Christian friends in whose lives God has worked." Through our friends loyalty to us and to God, those friends will hang in there with us and give us the assurance that our God is a God who works, even in the most hopeless situations. God is at work in your life today and he will be tomorrow. What our awesome God does is get you through it. I know I could not have made it through many terrible times in my life without God. But I did get through it and I am telling you, my feelings had nothing to do with it. Jesus Christ had everything to do with it.

We hope you will continue to enjoy the telling of Bill's walk in faith and next month we'll dive into Being Understood, Encouraging Words, and Only One Answer. We join in prayer for the Ministers in our Church, our Members, our Community, the earth, and all of those who are in need. We will walk with you and let the holy spirit be our guide. May you through our Lord Jesus Christ receive what God has promised all of us grace, mercy and peace.
