Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As some of you know, I am a bit of a movie geek. I love the craft, the stories, the actors (some of them anyway). The other night I had the pleasure to see David Lean's final film *A Passage to India*. What a treat. A scene from the film put me in mind of Our Saviour's and the current situation we face.

The late Dame Peggy Ashcroft plays an elderly Englishwoman who is seeing India in the 1920s for the first time with her future daughter-in-law. She has a childlike fascination with her surroundings. One beautiful moonlit night she sneaks off to a mosque and is looking around when she encounters an Indian doctor named Aziz who tells her she can't be there because she has shoes on.

She is quick to tell him she has taken her shoes off. He apologizes and says that many women walk with shoes in the mosque at night because they think no one is there. Her reply put me in mind of our church. She says simply, "God is here," and begins a friendship with the young Indian.

"God is here" makes me think back to when Bishop Humphrey visited us last month. He was keen to point out that even though we are losing Pastor Nickols we all still have each other and our love of God to unite us. In this time of change and transition, that is an important thing to remember.

The Call Committee has begun the process of filling the pastoral vacancy we will have in April. We sent out a survey as part of the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) that must be filled out and returned to the Bishop's office in Roanoke. We are grateful that nearly half of the congregation returned the survey. Your thoughts, preferences, and concerns have been noted with the committee's thanks. You will be updated as we progress.

Moving forward, we will work diligently toward our goal of finding our next pastor. We ask for your prayers, patience, and understanding throughout this important task. God is still here and so are we.

Bill Kinard The Promise of Hope

VISTRY. Chapter 33 For a Reason Growing up I had an aunt who had polio as a child. Because of this, one leg was much shorter than the other, and she always wore a special shoe with a huge lift (seriously it was 12 inches!) on one foot and a regular shoe on the other. Aunt Marion also walked with a cane, (I will add she often used that cane on children who didn't do what she asked quickly!) she had hip problems, and was a gifted mathematician as a tenured professor at the University of Chicago. Aunt Marion was fond of saying "the good Lord only gave each of us what we could handle. Look at me, I am a cripple, but I am well educated, live well, and God helps them who help themselves. God has a reason for who we are and what we become." Wow, I even thought this was actually in the Bible! Spoiler alert, it's not! The promise in 1 Corinthians 10:13 is not about God not giving us more than we can handle, it is about God not allowing temptation to overwhelm us without Him providing a way of escape so that we can **endure** the temptation and not fall into sin. What Aunt Marion didn't understand, author Andrew Greely, a Roman Catholic priest and writer whose outpouring of sociological research and contemporary theology, summed up well in an article for the Chicago Tribune. "We humans are meaning-creating animalssuspended in the web of meaning that we ourselves have spun. Faced with senseless and ironic tragedy, we search for meaning with far more confidence in our ability to divine the will of the ultimate powers of God than what we should have". God didn't give Aunt Marion polio because she could handle it. This is a terrible disease that cripples and kills.

I agree with Bill "When it comes to claiming to know the secret providence of God, I draw a blank". I too think I know some of what God is doing and what he demands of me. The written word of God tells me and is my best guide. Claiming to know God's providence for the bad things that happen in our lives leaves me incredulous and indignant. Maybe I have my Pollyanna shades on as I write this, but I'm very content to let God be God and I don't have to know or understand everything. I personally don't believe God caused my Aunt Marion's polio because she was a tough 'ole bird (although she was). I can't explain the deaths of teenagers in their high school, or the death of Scott's cousin at age 12 of leukemia. I can't explain these things. They are mysteries to me. Why can't we just say, "I don't know, I don't understand it, but I still love and trust God"? I know we can stand up for what is right. I know we can call, write, email our leaders for change. I know we can give money for research for cancer, for mental illness and vote our conscience for leaders who will champion change.

Do we have to determine a reason, God's reason, for every horrible thing that happens in our world? No, I don't see much peace in that, or even solace for the afflicted. To think that God brings about such death and destruction can too easily lead to bitterness, fear, and resentment. I do believe, though, that God can bring good out of the worst tragedies, regardless of what or who may have caused them (or allowed them, as some pundits put it). In fact, I think one of the greatest aspects of God's majesty is to bring good out of evil. Jesus' bodily resurrection is evidence enough of that. There are "resurrections" going on all the time-resurrections of hopes and dreams, new life where hope was dead and buried.

What we can be assured of is that when we go through those difficult trials, God will be with us. He will also use those trials to develop perseverance and proven character, see Roman 5:3-4, 15:5, James 1:2-4. He will use our experiences of His

strength showing up in our storm to comfort others who are going through similar trials. We can say to them from experience "you will make it through". Bill concludes his Chapter For a Reason with this: "If we look more to the possibilities that can come out of tragedy than to the cause of it, we will all be more at peace". For me, take a stand, change how you interact with others in our church family, and with all other people. Speak out if something is not right, make a difference, vote, donate your time, energy, money, and efforts to making change happen. I hope you are finding Bill Kinards the Promise of Hope, challenging (I am) and thought provoking. I am sharing this to help cope when life caves in. We join in prayer for the ministers in our church, and all of those who are in need. We Stephen Ministers will walk with you and let the Holy Spirit be our guide. May **YOU** through our **Lord Jesus Christ** receive what **God has promised** all of us grace, mercy and peace. We pray in your holy name. Amen.




